

Message from the presidents

2022: A year of transitions

n 2022, Washington County Council of Churches/HARC celebrated 75 years of service in this community. Reflecting on the history of our work together as a faith community collaboration, it is remarkable how our Creator has pulled us together through the years and through many changes to support one another and serve in ways that truly make an impact. This history is rich and important; yet changing times, evolving needs, and new leadership call us to serve in new ways, remaining sensitive to how the Spirit is working among us.



We — Rev. Christopher Serufusa and Rabbi Mark Perman — jointly led HARC for the remainder of the year. We continue to lead into 2023. HARC's new president will be Rev. Serufusa, and the new vice president will be Rabbi Mark.

Through the transitions and celebrations, HARC and our member congregations moved forward with great energy! Our work included strengthening and growing Micah's Backpack, and once again holding a Good Friday Unity Walk and an Interfaith Community Thanksgiving Service *in person*. We responded to the war in Ukraine and the tragic shooting in Smithsburg with prayer vigils and interfaith support. And we took a deeper dive into learning about other faiths through Rabbi Mark's Interfaith Roundtable radio show.

Building on groundwork laid in 2021, HARC's Racial Justice Team partnered to launch a new Equity in Education Scholarship, awarding scholarships to four African-American women pursuing degrees in education.

An inspiring and challenging board retreat in July led to further fleshing out of our four Belief Statements and the goals and action steps that flow from them. In September, many of our members participated in prioritizing those goals. You can see the results in this report.

We thank God for the work HARC has done in the community. We thank God for the volunteers and partners who work with HARC. Many thanks to Kathy Powderly for her tireless efforts to keep us together through transitions. Blessings to you in the New Year!

Much of this work also fits under other categories, so here we include primarily the building of interfaith and interdenominational relationships, which leads to more tangible efforts that fall under our other three Belief Statements.

The Interfaith Team

The Interfaith Team, formerly Interfaith Coalition of Washington County, continued to solidify as a part of HARC in 2022. The team identified ways to educate the public on the world's faith traditions, focusing on two events: the Interfaith Progressive Dinner and HARC's annual Interfaith Community Thanksgiving Service, while also including other peripheral projects.

Interfaith Progressive Dinner

The first-annual Interfaith Progressive Dinner was held on Sunday, September 11, 2022, with approximately 85 people attending. Four courses were served, each at a different house of worship. Faith leaders at each location shared the history and tradition of their faith and presented a short program, from honoring those fallen on 9/11 to

moving toward a world of peace. The participating houses of worship were Zion Reformed United Church of Christ (appetizers), Congregation B'nai Abraham (soup and salad), The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (entrée), and the Islamic Society of Western Maryland (desserts).

Thanksgiving Service

Our annual Interfaith Community Thanksgiving Service was held on Sunday, November 20, 2022, attended by approximately 100 people. Held at St. Ann Roman Catholic Church, leaders from various faith traditions including Baha'i, Jewish and Christian participated. A free-will offering included non-perishable food and monetary donations collected for local food pantries.

Coming up in 2023

The **Interfaith Book Club** will resume in January via Zoom. The selection for January is *The Book of Joy* by H.H. the Dalia Lama and Archbishop Desmond Tutu, with Douglas Abrams.

The team is also planning for the **International Season for Peace and Non-Violence** in early 2023. This season begins with the anniversary of the assassination of Mahatma Gandhi on January 30, ending on the anniversary of the assassination of Martin Luther King, Jr., on April 4. The HARC website, www.harccoalition.org, has many resources on the Season for Non-violence that can be used in houses of worship, communities, schools, and by individuals.

An Interfaith Retreat: "Sensing the Divine," is scheduled for Saturday, March 4, 2023, at Shepherd's Spring Camp & Retreat Center. We'll explore the idea that the Divine is everywhere present; we only need to open our eyes and ears, and learn to use our spiritual senses to get in touch with our own inner mystic.

Micah's Backpack

Since schools returned to in-person learning, the Micah's Backpack program began to grow again and ran smoothly for the 2021-22 school year. We are grateful to all the sponsoring churches and organizations that have continued to do the week-to-week work of feeding children in this program despite the challenges of bouncing back from the pandemic.

We are also grateful to the school liaisons, who face so many extra challenges in their jobs, yet still make it a priority to identify children who are food-insecure and make sure they receive their bags of food each week.

Survey results for the 2021-22 school year include:

63% of parents said this extra food helps them pay other bills.

62% of parents indicated that their child has been sick less since receiving the bags and **68%** said their children are absent less.

53% of school staff noticed improvement in behavior of students during the school day.

65% of school staff agreed that students are more engaged in learning during the school day and **52%** indicated that student grades have improved.

95% of school staff indicated that this program cultivates a more positive relationship between students and coordinators/school staff.

So far, this 2022-23 school year...

has gotten off to a smooth start, but we are seeing the number of children who need extra food climb significantly. School liaisons say this is due to special pandemic programs ending, as well as higher prices for basic needs such as food, housing, and transportation.

Updates for this school year include:

- 49 sponsoring churches and organizations are currently serving more than 1,100 students in 37 schools with weekly food.
- Four schools were added in 2022; we are now serving 80% of schools in Washington County.
- HARC increased our effort to connect houses of worship and schools for other needs of children.



Filling the gaps

In 2021, we asked organization that work with children what the faith community can do to help fill the gaps for children and families. Two of the priorities, they said, were to offer programs for families such as Learning Parties and Parent Cafes, and to offer ACEs/trauma education to the community because these programs make a difference. We listened and rebooted these effective programs.

Understanding ACEs, Building Resilience

Adverse Childhood Experiences, or ACEs (a.k.a. childhood trauma) are common, present likely the greatest health crises of our time, and the effects manifest in many ways throughout the community. There is a clear and scientifically proven cause and effect relationship between ACEs and many health and social problems, including mental illness, suicide, substance abuse, heart disease, lung disease, obesity, to name a few.

A child who suffers from ACEs and doesn't have a strong relationship with a healthy adult can actually sustain changes to their brain that affect regulation of logic, impulse control, and decision making. These changes can lead to lifelong difficulties.

But there is hope for prevention and healing. And our faith communities are uniquely equipped to help. In 2022, we offered the following to help build awareness, understanding, and provide practical tools for healing and building resilience:

- Training for staff, mentors and parents of Big Brothers Big Sisters
- Workshop for teen and young adult parents at the Washington County Family Center
- "ACEs & Resilience" workshop for faith leaders at HARC's March 8 meeting

Learning Parties & Parent Cafés

Learning Parties are fun, interactive programs for families and their 3-to-4-year-old children, with hands-on activities and tips that promote young children's development of school readiness skills. This series focused on building social and emotional skills. Volunteers from several different congregations helped to make it happen.

In November, a handful of volunteers attended an Introduction to Parent Cafés to learn what this parent-supportive program is all about. Parent Cafés provide a safe and supportive forum for parents to talk about their every day experiences and learn new parenting and coping skills from one another. Another training for "table hosts" will follow in 2023.

Interfaith Prayer Vigil held in support of the Ukrainian people

On Sunday, March 6, the faith community and the community at large came together in Hagerstown's Public Square to pray for peace and safety in Ukraine and to stand in solidarity with her people.

This one-hour program included words of support from leaders of different faiths and backgrounds, prayers, song, silence, and a personal story from Volodymyr Grinchenko, a local Ukrainian-American chaplain with Hospice of Washington County. Grinchenko offered practical ways that we can help, which were shared via social media.

The Racial Justice Team

HARC's Racial Justice Team was formed in May 2021, and continues its work on a variety of endeavors to seek equity, opportunities, and to bring to the forefront the gifts of people of color in Washington County.

This team's goals include developing a **Washington County Black Professionals Network** (WCBPN), for the purpose of connection, support, safety, belonging, and economic prosperity.

The mission of the WCBPN is to provide professional networking opportunities and to attract and retain under-represented professionals in the community by establishing connections for Blacks of the African diaspora in Hagerstown and surrounding areas.

The vision of the WCBPN is to:

- Foster an inclusive community among black professionals.
- Create opportunities for Black-owned businesses that will lead to economic growth.
- Work collaboratively within the WCBPN to improve the perception of Washington County to attract and retain more Black professionals to the area.
- Provide networking opportunities for Black-owned businesses to support one another and yield greater profitability.
- Develop opportunities to educate the community regarding entrepreneurship and financial empowerment.
- Leverage the power of the Network to create opportunities that enhance the lived experience of members of the African-American community.

More educators from underrepresented groups

Another goal of the Racial Justice Team is to advocate for more educators in Washington County who are from underrepresented ethnic groups and to support retention efforts.

Through the WCBPN, educators who are from underrepresented ethnic groups have an opportunity to network with other professionals of color in our community.

WASHINGTON COUNTY BLACK PROFESSIONALS NETWORK

The kick-off event for the WCBPN is scheduled for February 2023. This event will be an opportunity for Black professionals in the Washington County area to attend an information session, to network, and to join the WCBPN. Through this connection, we hope to increase retention of Washington County teachers of color.

The **Equity in Education Scholarship** was launched in 2022 with \$16,500 in scholarships awarded to four African American women to pursue degrees in education. This effort is a partnership of HARC, Washington County Public Schools, The Education Foundation of Washington County, and Rise Up Hagerstown.

This scholarship program:

- Removes financial barriers for racially minoritized people to pursue degrees in education,
- Increases the number of diverse educators in our public schools,
- Supports retention of diverse educators through mentoring and resources,
- Ultimately helps children, especially children of color, do better in school.

Our 2023 goal is to provide up to seven scholarships, while continuing to mentor/support our 2022 recipients. Financial support of this program is critical. Advocate for transportation

The Racial Justice team reached out to Washington County Public Schools (WCPS) administration to advocate for transportation for students to special school programs. Students from the Barbara Ingram School for the Arts, for example, would be provided transportation from their home high schools to their home school bus stops in the afternoon. Progress is underway on this effort.

Educate on systemic racial injustice

Educating people of faith and the community at large on systemic racial injustice is an important goal of the Racial Justice team. A six-week diversity training program was held at Otterbein United Methodist Church in 2022. In 2023, half-day training opportunities will be scheduled in the Spring.

MARCH Understanding Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), Healing, and Building Resilience, held at Grace United Methodist Church. David Washington of the Washington County Health Department offered a "Triumph Over Trauma" curriculum opportunity.

APRIL Dealing with the Lingering Effects of the Pandemic on Congregations and Faith Leaders,

program offered by Rev. Ron Shank, Director of Pastoral Care at Brook Lane Health Services, held at Zion Reformed United Church of Christ. This program included practical tips for self-care and dealing with pandemic effects in our congregations, as well as a better understanding of what youth in our community are experiencing and their mental health challenges.



HARC Hike for Hunger & Hope

On June 4, 2022, around 85 people came out to hike 4K, 10K, or half-marathon distances on the C&O Canal Towpath to support HARC and Micah's Backpack. It was a beautiful day with great fellowship, exploration of nature, and great food.

Another 22 people participated in the "Virtual Hike," walking on their own or with the Prime Time for Women hikers group.
