HARC had a great year of ministry! One focus in 2023 was the mental health crisis and prevention of the opioid crisis. Houses of worship hosted health summits, offering counsel toward recovery. While these crises persist, these interventions created hope and fostered recovery for many people.

Supporting arriving refugees in Hagerstown was another challenging mission HARC engaged in through the **Refugee Welcome**Network. Faith communities shared in the task of getting families settled in apartments, providing furniture and food. These efforts have been extraordinary, showing how we are our brother's and sister's keeper. The outpouring of love and support from the community has been outstanding!

The community **Good Friday Unity Walk** was meaningful, singing songs of the Lord, reading the holy scripture, and looking to the resurrection Easter Sunday with our Christian brethren. The **HARC Hike for Hunger and Hope** brought the community together again, raising more than \$30,000 for HARC and Micah's Backpack! The lunch and fellowship at the conclusion of the Hike was delightful. Our second-annual **Interfaith Progressive Dinner**, and the Interfaith panel discussions were wonderful because people visited and shared meals together. The bond of love was tied strongly.

Interfaith Progressive Dinner

At each location, participants enjoyed culturally relevant foods and faith leaders presented a short program on the history and beliefs of their faith.

Interfaith Community Thanksgiving Service

Our annual Interfaith Community Thanksgiving Service was held on Sunday, November 19, at Trinity Lutheran Church in Hagerstown. Leaders from various faith traditions including Christian, Muslim, Jewish, Buddhist, Unity, Baha'i, and Secular Humanist participated. Attendees were invited to enjoy a reception after the service.

A free-will offering included shelf-stable food for

Trinity Lutheran's food pantry, and monetary donations. Monetary donations went to purchase staples for the food pantry of the Islamic Society of Hagerstown, which were immediately distributed to local Afghan refugee families.

Micah's Backpack

A partnership of HARC, Washington County Public Schools, Maryland Food Bank, and 48 sponsoring houses of worship and organizations

he need for the Micah's Backpack program has continued to grow at a rapid rate during this current school year, as special pandemic programs have ended, including rental assistance, as of July 2023. Costs have risen and families are struggling more than ever. School staff say they hear more children verbalizing that they don't have enough food at home.

We are grateful that all the sponsoring houses of worship and organizations have been nimble and so generous, with some shifting to different schools as needed and many increasing the number of children they serve. They consistently do the week-to-week work of feeding children in this program, despite the challenges. We're also grateful to the school liaisons, who face so many extra challenges in their jobs, yet still make it a priority to identify children who are food-insecure and make sure they receive their bags of food each week.

Micah's Backpack makes a difference Survey results from the 2022-23 school year

82% of children said they were able to pay more attention in school because they are less hungry since receiving the bags

77% of children indicated they sometimes come to school only to get food

96% of children said they feel better in school when they're not hungry

58% of parents indicate they feel more engaged in their child's school since receiving the bags

72% of parents said this extra food enables them to pay other bills

88% of school staff agreed that students are more engaged in learning during the school day

100% of school staff indicated that this program cultivates a more positive relationship between students and coordinators/school staff

Updates for this school year include:

- 48 sponsoring houses of worship and organizations are currently serving more than 1,200 students in 37 schools with weekly food.
- Micah's Backpack is now serving 80% of schools in Washington County
- Current sponsors are stretched to their limits. More sponsoring houses of worship/organizations are needed!

Meetings with Mayor lead to new after-school program

In April, a delegation of HARC members began meeting monthly with Mayor Tekesha Martinez to discuss common goals for the City of Hagerstown. Mayor Martinez invited the faith community into partnership, and the fruitful discussions led to several houses of worship in the downtown area collaborating on an after-school program for children.

A special team was formed to focus on this project, including exploring options for funding, hiring of a coordinator for the program as well as other staff.

Administrators at Washington County Public Schools (WCPS) are as excited as we are to get this program started in 2024!

Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), building resilience

Adverse Childhood Experiences, or ACEs (a.k.a. childhood trauma) are common, and present likely the greatest health crises of our time. There is a scientifically proven link between ACEs and many health and social problems, including mental illness, suicide, substance abuse, obesity, to name a few.

But there is hope. Our faith communities are uniquely equipped to help with prevention and healing. HARC offers training workshops to groups and organizations in our community to build awareness, understanding, and to provide practical tools for healing and building resilience. Refugee Welcome Network

n January, HARC partnered with the Islamic Center of Hagerstown and many other area organizations and houses of faith to create the Refugee Welcome Network (RWN) of Washington County, Md.

Throughout the year, the RWN continued to grow, with additional houses of faith, volunteers, and resources joining our efforts to help refugee families get settled in the community.

And the community has been incredibly generous in helping our refugee friends become settled and self-sufficient. Thanks to all who have been and continue to be a part of the RWN



through your contributions of time, treasure, and talents!

The work of the RWN

Under the auspices of HARC, approximately 15 community members meet at least once a month to facilitate support for our refugee community. We help procure affordable housing, jobs, school enrollment, household items, health care, and applicable social services. We assist families with applications for asylum, Temporary Protected Status (TPS), and Employment Authorization Documents (EAD).

Fortunately, God led a retired immigration lawyer to our team, so we do not have to pay for legal counsel. However, the path to eventual citizenship, which each of our families ardently desires, is costly. The fee to apply for TPS and EADs for a family of four is \$1,200. But the RWN and the families we assist have enjoyed success along the way. Gradually, refugee family members have received work permits and been granted asylum. So our work continues.

The Racial Justice Team

HARC's Racial Justice Team realized a major goal in 2023 of forming the **Washington County Black Professionals Network** (WCBPN) to provide opportunities to connect, as well as fostering support, safety, belonging, and economic prosperity for people of color in Washington County.

The mission of the WCBPN is to provide professional networking opportunities and to attract and retain under-represented professionals in the community by establishing connections for Blacks of the African diaspora in Hagerstown

and surrounding areas.

The WCBPN held several networking events in 2023, and developed the **Black-owned Business Directory**, which continues to expand.

With help from a \$15,000 grant from the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland, the WCBPN is poised for continued growth in 2024.

The WCBPN also created a Facebook page, which has continued to grow its followers by regularly posting news and events of interest to Black professionals and entrepreneurs in the community.

Another goal of the Racial Justice Team is to advocate for more educators in Washington County who are from under-represented ethnic groups and to support retention efforts. In addition to encouraging people of color to apply to Washington County Public Schools (WCPS), the team partnered with WCPS and the Education Foundation of WCPS to provide direct support to aspiring educators.

The **Equity in Education Scholarship**, launched in 2022, awarded scholarships for 2023-2024 to five African American women to pursue degrees in education. This scholarship program:

■ Removes financial barriers for racially minoritized people to pursue degrees in education

- Increases the number of diverse educators in our public schools
- Supports retention of diverse educators through mentoring and resources
- Ultimately helps children, especially children of color, do better in school.

The 2024 scholarship application period will be open from February 1 through March 31, 2024. Scholarships are awarded annually ranging from \$1,500 to \$7,000. Connect, learn, share

ne of the ways we **equip one another** is by presenting informational programs at our monthly meetings. These programs are relevant to faith leaders, houses of worship, and our other member organizations. Programs are geared to faith leaders and members, but anyone is welcome to attend. Our meetings are also a fun place to network, catch up with old friends and meet new ones! Below are program topics from 2023.

JANUARY: At our **Annual Meeting,** we voted on and welcomed new Board members. The **Interfaith Team** shared events and activities planned for 2023, and the **Racial Justice Team** promoted the inaugural event of the Washington County Black Professionals Network to be held in February.

FEBRUARY: "Dialogue that Enlarges: Bridging Ideological Divides Through a Faith Lens" Rabbi Mark Perman and Kathy Powderly led a workshop created by The Better Arguments Project, a national civic initiative created to help bridge divides. Attendees explored better ways to handle conflict, with the hope of taking this program back to their congregations and organizations. This resource is available on the HARC website under Non-violence and Peacemaking Resources.

MARCH: Presentation by the **Department of Social Services (DSS)** of Washington County, Md. DSS Director Tiffany Rexrode, along with Amanda Bishop, and Josh Bond gave an overview of programs and services, highlighting some ways the faith community can support their work, and answering our questions.

<u>APRIL</u>: Panel discussion by **Black entrepreneurs** in Washington County. **Eddie Peters, Cherish McMillon, Ladetra Robinson,** and **Sommer Gilliam** shared their successes and challenges as Black business owners, and ways the faith community can help.

MAY: "The Rise of Antisemitism and What We Can Do As a Faith Community" featured a presentation via Zoom from the Anti-Defamation League (ADL).

<u>JUNE</u>: "Migration Then & Now in the Jewish & Islamic Faiths" Speakers: Basheer Azizi, president of the Islamic Center of Hagerstown, and Rabbi Mark Perman, Congregation B'Nai Abraham, talked about historical migration among Muslims and Jews worldwide, and in our area.

OCTOBER: Speakers Victoria Sterling of the Washington County Health Department, and Carrie Tressler of the Washington County Mental Health Authority provided extensive information on "Mental Health Challenges, Programs and Resources" in our community.

NOVEMBER: A diverse panel of clergy from different faith traditions discussed "Challenges Religions Face in Today's Society." Panelists were, from left, Rabbi Mark Perman, Rev. Dionne Hall, Rev. Les McIntosh, Imam Nazir Faruki, and moderator Dr. Sohrab Shahab.



DECEMBER: Speakers from San Mar Family and Community Services explored "What It Means to be a 'Healing Community'" and the role the faith community can play. We heard from Jerica Washington, LCSW-C, Deputy Executive Director and Director of the Jack E. Barr Center for Well-Being; and Jennifer Lewis, LCSW-C, Director, Treatment Foster Care.

THE HARC HIKE FOR HUNGER & HOPE






very year, HARC's biggest fundraisers are its Hikes for Hunger & Hope: the Main Hike and the Challenge Hike. The proceeds from these two events benefit HARC programs, particularly Micah's Backpack, which provides nutritious food to food-insecure school children on the weekends in Washington County (to read more about Micah's Backpack, see page 7).

On June 10, nearly 100 people came out to hike 4K, 10K, or half-marathon distances on the scenic C&O Canal Towpath. It was a beautiful day with great fellowship, exploration of nature, and wonderful food! Another 13 people participated in a "Virtual

Hike," hiking at a day and time of their choosing, either on their own or with a group.

"I'm looking forward to working on the Board to further HARC's commitment to service in the community."

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
